Introduction

This collection of letters offers a window into the mind and actions of George Cadle Price, the Father of the Nation and a Belizean National Hero. Born on 15 January 1919, Price dedicated his life to leading the country from colonial rule to self-government and independence.

Price's life was marked by a deep commitment to service, social justice and the welfare of the Belizean people. His formative years, spent in spiritual pursuit to be a priest, later converged with his role as the country's most gifted political leader. His dedication to the advancement of Belize set him apart as a leader who prioritized the nation's collective progress over his personal gain. His contributions to Belize's political, social and economic landscape are countless with his influence reaching far beyond the letters compiled in this collection.

Many of the letters in this collection are from George Price's term as Premier of Belize, which was the title given to him as the highest elected leader during the period of self-government from 1964–1981. These correspondences housed at the Belize Archives and Records Service explore a wide range of issues, from national unity and independence to environmental concerns and development. These letters, many of which are addressed to key political figures and institutions, demonstrate his hands-on approach to governance and his commitment to building a more united Belize.

The title of this booklet, "Good Belizeans," reflects a phrase George Price used on several occasions, including in a 1965 letter to the Hattieville Village Council, where he wrote, "You are good Belizeans, and when more of us unite to build a nation, we shall get independence in a quicker time." These words, along with the inscription on his epitaph - "A good Belizean, one who went through life on a pilgrimage, and left the world a better place than he found it" — capture the thoughtfulness and vision that defined Price's leadership.

These letters are important for us to analyse and appreciate the strengths and weaknesses of our political and social development. Thanks to the collaboration of historians Giovani Pinelo (ISCR-NICH) and Delmer Tzib (UB) we are treated to key reflection summaries of the selected letters. We are grateful to the leadership and professional team at the various divisions of the National Institute of Culture and History, the Belize Archives and Records Service, the Belize National Library Service and Information System, and the George Price Centre for Peace and Development for making these records available in print and online form. This interest stems from the vision of the Access501 initiative which is led by the Hon. Francis Fonseca as Minister of Education, Culture, Science, and Technology, seeking to ensure that students, teachers and the wider public have access to open-access resources for teaching and learning.

As we observe George Price Day 2025, we are also featuring the creation of a street exhibit, a botanical garden at the Price Family House, and the digitization of Price's memorabilia. The National Institute of Culture and History and its partners remain committed to fostering unity and development through research, education, and cultural and artistic engagement.

The Call for National Unity

During the 1940s, movements for decolonization and workers' rights gained momentum in Belize, then the colony of British Honduras. A small group of mostly Jesuit-educated leaders became instrumental in advancing the nationalist movement, challenging the inequities of colonialism. Their agitation against colonialism and improving workers' rights was readily received by fellow compatriots yearning for more political authority to direct their development.

By 1949, Belize faced significant social and economic challenges, including a decline in the mahogany and chicle industries. The economic strain deepened when the colonial governor used his reserve power to devalue the British Honduras dollar, exacerbating public discontent.

In response to these crises, a group of concerned activists formed the People's Committee (PC) to address the worsening conditions, confront colonial policies, and advocate for self-governance. The committee's strategy emphasized national unity for resisting devaluation and advancing the fight for self-determination. By August 1950, George Price, the PC's secretary, was actively involved in organizing and mobilizing these efforts.

The accompanying letter from the Price Family Archive showcases the organizational methods employed by the People's Committee to convene meetings and secure commitment from its leadership and members.

The residence at Lot 1114, No. 3 Pickstock Street, Belize City, played a pivotal role in shaping the path toward Belizean independence.




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Environmental Concerns and Development

Premier Price intricately linked Belize's national identity with environmental concerns, development, and appreciation of Belize's vast resources. Price exemplified leadership grounded in action, from picking up trash himself to directing ministers and other public officials in carrying out their duties. His letters reflect this commitment, presenting practical solutions to national challenges while fostering collaboration among public officers, community leaders, and citizens.

The letters in this section highlight Price's vision for Belize's sustainable development. In a letter from 1965 and another from 1973 he encouraged tree planting to enhance the community spaces and foster unity. Another letter from September 1969 addressed the aftermath of a natural disaster, requesting seawall repairs at then Monkey River Town.



Planting of Trees in Hattieville

Now that the rainy season is approaching, it would be well to plant some shade trees alongside Hattieville in order to take away that desolate and bare look.

I would suggest the following trees: pine, seagrapes, flambouyant, etc.

All you have to do is to arrange with the Agricultural Department at Central Farm and they will supply the trees.

As Belize City extended into new zones, Premier Price recommended the planting of trees for the creation and preservation of green spaces across the municipality.


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Infrastructure and Road Safety

Premier Price was a pragmatic leader, dedicated to addressing the challenges of everyday Belizeans. Infrastructural development, particularly for transportation, was critical for safety and communication. Additionally, Price actively sought tangible international cooperation and investments to Belize, as seen in his correspondence regarding the BELCAN Bridge.

Premier Price listened to residents and acted on pressing issues. In his letter of April 1969, he expressed concerns about an accident at Hector Creek, seeking immediate solutions to prevent further incidents. In another letter from January 1974, he addresses the speeding limits, emphasizing his commitment to public safety as part of national development.

In the following letters, Premier Price focuses on improving infrastructure and access to rural communities, as well as traffic safety.

Education and Health

From self-government to independence, Premier Price worked to create opportunities for Belizeans to access public services. He believed education was crucial for civic engagement and nation-building, as attested through the letters of May and September 1973. Furthermore, in a March 1973 letter, Price aimed to facilitate a trip for San Pedro College students to observe the legislative process at work.

Similarly, a letter of January 1975 requesting health services for an individual demonstrates Price's personal attentiveness to the well-being of the vulnerable. Such actions are reminders that we are all called to serve with care and diligence.



The Struggle for Independence

In the 1960s and 1970s, Belize's quest for independence was a multifaceted process that involved both national and international efforts to achieve political support for self-determination and shape a new national identity. Guatemala's claims to Belize's territory were a major obstacle that significantly delayed independence. However, Premier Price, in close collaboration with other nationalist leaders and wide-spread popular support, carried out strategic actions to advance the country's path to self-determination.

The letters included in this section illustrate these efforts, including calls for citizen participation in rallies to support independence. Price also actively publicized the name Belize and its corresponding symbols on the path towards an independent nation. This he did through the school system as well as on the national radio of that era. These letters not only urged action but also emphasized that independence could not be achieved without the active involvement of the people.

On the international stage, Price lobbied support for Belize's independence from international partners. In 1973, Caribbean diplomat Sir Shridath Ramphal expressed the Caribbean countries' relentless support for Belize's independence and territorial integrity at a UN Security Council meeting in Panama City. Price's handwritten note of thanks attests his gratitude for diplomacy.

Collectively, these letters demonstrate how both internal and external forces shaped Belize's transition to full independence in 1981.

His communication was personal, sincere, and indicative of the bonds he sought to forge with fellow Belizeans across the nation.

Observations on Horse Racing

Dear Mr. Minister,

Please accept my observations on the races yesterday, which no doubt you have made. They are:

- (1) L_0 teness in starting races. It seems to me Mr. Morter, the official starter, is single handed and he may need assistance to get the following race started while the actual race is still in preparation, so that there is a continual flow of races.
- (2) It seems to me the committee must be enlarged. It does not seem right that one person should be handicapper and judge at the same time. I have great esteem for Mr. Conrad Jones and Mr. Eddie Cassasola and I think they are doing a good job under difficult circumstances. They must be given assistance.
- (3) This is one you have already decided to make a paddock to keep the crowd out of the stables.
- (4) In order to encourage and accommodate district owners of horses, they should be given a time before the races to practise their horses using the starting gate. For instance, I encouraged Mr. Herman Davis to bring his horse in. He brought Lady D but he did not have a chance to practise his horse with the starting gate until the morning of the races.
